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
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


This Album pays tribute to Prabhakaran, a unique leader recognized as a legend in his own time, who has restored the identity, integrity and dignity of the Tamil Nation.

Prabhakaran

A Leader for All Seasons

The end of the Second World War spawned many liberation struggles in the Afro-Asia regions. Before the war, the European colonial powers, for administrative convenience, had amalgamated small countries and distinct regions into single administrative units with little consideration for their racial and cultural sensitivities and histories.

In the island of Sri Lanka too, the British amalgamated the Tamil and Sinhala Kingdoms - which until then had been treated as separate entities by the earlier Portugese and Dutch rulers - into one unit. When independence was granted in 1948, they handed the administration of the whole island to the Sinhalese in Colombo.

For decades, political and peaceful campaigns by the Tamil people for the restoration of their rights were answered with discrimination, intimidation and military oppression by the Sinhala forces. Ultimately the Tamils resorted to an armed liberation struggle. From this ultimate stand by the Tamils for their self preservation and dignity, rose the **Man of Destiny, Prabhakaran.**

From Visionary to Leader

Valvettithurai was a famous port of the last Jaffna Kingdom which existed from the early 13th Century to the 17th Century. It was here that Prabhakaran was born on 26th November 1954. His parents, Veluppillai of Thirumeniyar and Parvathy, daughter of Nagalingam of Pt. Pedro, were both from orthodox, affluent families. Veluppillai was a Lands Officer for the Sri Lankan Government. Prabhakaran was the youngest of their four children.

"I was brought up in an environment of strict discipline from childhood... Great store was laid by personal rectitude and discipline. My father set an example through his own personal conduct..."

His education at Chithambara College in Valvettithurai was nonedescript and he was an average student. He loved history and read avidly of the lives of great leaders like Alexander the Great and Napoleon. The Indian nationalist leaders, Subhas Chandra Bose and Bhagat Singh, were to become sources of inspiration to him. It was the norm for children of affluent families in Jaffna to continue their education in English in preparation to go abroad or to join the Government Service. However, the young Prabhakaran was different.

He became highly sensitive to the harassment and intimidation of the Tamils by the Sinhala armed forces even as a child. The 1958 anti-Tamil riots left him deeply disturbed.

"...I heard horrifying incidents of how our people had been mercilessly and brutally put to death by Sinhala racists. Once I met a widowed mother, a friend of my family, who related to me her agonizing personal experience of this racial holocaust. A Sinhala mob attacked her house in Colombo. The rioters set fire to the house and murdered her husband. She and her children escaped with severe burn injuries... When I heard such stories of cruelty, I felt a deep sense or sympathy and love for my people..."

The discriminatory policy of standardisation which deprived Tamils of fair university and employment opportunities angered him even as a Year 10 student. He and fellow students joined the Tamil Students Organisation (Thamil Maanavar Peravai).

Instead of addressing their grievances, the Government arrested and tortured these students. This only served to fuel the indignation of the young Prabhakaran.

In 1972, at the age of 17, he gathered his colleagues and formed the resistance movement, "Tamil New Tigers", the members coming from friends and relatives. The Movement grew into an armed Liberation movement and changed its name on 5th May 1976 to the *Liberation Tigers of Tamil Eelam*.

Prabhakaran stressed adherence to a strict code of conduct as the main criteria for membership into the LTTE. When asked once who were his beacons, his reply was characteristic:

"Nature is my friend, Life my philosopher and History my guide."

History is full of tales of men who rose to meet the need of the time. Here was one such Man; the time of need had come for the Tamil people for such a man. Today, to his followers he is the inspiring object of devotion and respect, their 'Annai'.

To the Tamil people in the north and east of Sri Lanka and to the hundreds of thousands of Tamils flung all over the globe, he is the unquestioned Leader, simply, their 'Thalaivar'.




Prabhakaran aged 17

Speaking of formative influences on his character to N. Ram, the then Associate Editor of 'The Hindu':

"...From my boyhood, the struggle that attracted me most was the Indian freedom struggle. The role of Netaji attracted me very much... Subhas attracted me particularly... He became my special hero and some of his orations gripped me. For example, 'I shall fight for the freedom of my land until I shed my last drop of blood.' These words used to thrill me whenever they came to me. Then the story of Bhagat Singh fascinated me."


Tamils at home and abroad have rallied behind the leadership of Prabhakaran who has achieved remarkable military victories and restored lost territory under Tamil control. He has established a de facto state with a unique administrative and judicial structure for the Tamil homeland.

The ability to defend territory coupled with the strength to recapture lost territory has given the Liberation Tigers the strength and confidence to negotiate a political settlement for their people. With this confidence, Prabhakaran initiated a unilateral ceasefire in December 2001. A peace process with Sri Lanka facilitated by the Government of Norway has been underway with a Memorandum of understanding signed in February 2002. A settlement however, is yet to be achieved.

The Tamil people have put their absolute trust in Prabhakaran as the only leader capable of leading them in war and peace. This was reinforced by the resounding victory of the LTTE backed Tamil National Alliance at the 2004 elections.

The Peace-mover

Prabhakaran has consistently and continually reiterated his desire for a political solution through peaceful means. His several attempts to find a negotiated solution to the ethnic conflict have not been grasped by the two major Sinhala political parties in the South which failing to realize the genuine desire of the Tamil leadership, have continued to pursue a military solution.

In November 2000 and again in November 2001, Prabhakaran initiated peace by declaring unilateral ceasefires. A Norwegian government-facilitated memorandum of understanding was signed with the new government of Prime Minister Ranil Wickremasinghe in February 2002. A political settlement, however, is yet to be negotiated. Yet again, due to the power struggle between the two major Sinhala political parties of Sri Lanka, it appears that history is about to repeat itself.

Prabhakaran has referred to this in his annual Heroes Day address in November 2003:

"... As a tragic drama without an ending, the Tamil ethnic conflict continues forever. Whenever the Party in power attempts to resolve the Tamil issue, the Party in Opposition opposes it and derails the effort. The mode of conflict continues even when the opposition becomes the ruling party and attempts reconciliation. This Sinhala political drama with its typical historical pattern has been staged regularly for the last 50 years. The directors of this bizarre drama are the two major Sinhala political parties. Though the main actors have been changing over time, the theme of the story is the same. The current political crisis in Colombo is an open enactment of this absurd drama..."

We want to resolve the Tamil conflict through peaceful means, through civilized methods, without recourse to a bloodbath and the destruction of life..."

Prabhakaran has never wavered from his desire for peace with honour.

"We are not opposed to peace, nor are we opposed to a resolution of the conflict by peaceful means. We want an authentic peace, a true, honourable, permanent peace; a condition in which our people can live with freedom and dignity in their own land without external coercion determining their own political life. We have grave doubts whether the forces of Sinhala-Buddhist chauvinism will allow such a peaceful life to the Tamil people."

"...We want the political negotiations to be held in an atmosphere of peace and normalcy, free from the conditions of war, military aggression and economic blockades. We are not stipulating any pre-conditions for peace talks. We are suggesting the creation of a climate of peace and goodwill to hold peace talks, a congenial environment in which our people must be free from the heavy burden of suffering imposed on them. We hold the view that political negotiations cannot be free, fair and just if the Government utlizes the military aggression on our soil and the restrictions imposed on the economic life of our people as political pressures..."

"...We wish to reiterate that peace talks should be held in a cordial peaceful atmosphere of mutual trust and goodwill with the assistance of international third party mediation. ...We are well aware that this war has not only affected the Tamils but also affects the Sinhala people deeply. We are also aware that it is the Sinhala masses who are bearing the economic burden of the war. Therefore, we call upon the Sinhala people to identify and renounce the racist forces committed to militarism and war and to offer justice to the Tamils in order to put an end to this bloody war and to bring about permanent peace..."



The parents of Sri Lankan prisoners of war were moved with gratitude and touched by the hospitality extended to them when the LTTE invited them to visit their sons.

"Our organisation, as well as our people do not want war. We want peace and we want to resolve our problems through peaceful means. We are deeply committed to the peace process. It is because of our sincere commitment to peace that we are firmly and rigidly observing ceasefire. It is our organisation that took the initiative of declaring the cessation of hostilities unilaterally and observing peace for the last two years tolerating the provocative actions of the state's armed forces."




'Thalaivar' The Leader




The Family Man





The Military Leader

"The world may sympathize when our people are slaughtered by Sinhala chauvinists. They may condemn, they may shed tears. But we must realize that protecting our people and securing their liberation is our own responsibility."

Today the LTTE led by Prabhakaran has attained the status of a conventional army, recognized as the most disciplined, inspired, incorruptible and resolute force the world has seen in modern times. This was not achieved simply. Prabhakaran nurtured the sense of righteous indignation and yearning for dignity in the hearts of his followers and in a miraculously short time turned them into a formidable fighting force. This can only happen when the leader himself displays the qualities required in his followers.

"Tamil fighters are forged from discipline, nationalism and worship of their leader. There is Prabhakaran, the incorruptible, who refuses to deviate from his goal of Eelam despite military pressure from India, despite offers of money and power from Colombo and New Delhi that turned the heads of less resolute Tamil leaders."




The Inspiration . . .

"Life is precious. But more precious than life is our freedom, our rights and our dignity."

Tamil History will acknowledge that in a relatively short time Prabhakaran has mobilised the Tamil People to feel as one for the liberation of their land. He has inspired a thirst for freedom that has sustained his people through untold hardship and misery.

"It is in the end, Prabhakaran whose will binds the Tigers. His followers call him *Annai*, or elder brother, and talk of him with wide-eyed awe, their only fear the possibility that they might let him down. 'He is mother, father and god all rolled into one,' says a guerrilla named Sunil. Government soldiers tell of a badly wounded female Tiger they captured at Elephant Pass. 



Honouring the Martyrs

Most often the Fallen in any war are remembered and honoured after the war. In the Liberation Struggle of Tamileelam, Prabhakaran initiated the remembrance and honour of the Fallen Heroes even in the midst of war and 27th November each year is celebrated as Heroes Day.

"Our liberation movement pays highest respect and reverence to our martyrs for their supreme sacrifice. We honour our martyrs as national heroes, as creators of the history of our national struggle. We commemorate our heroes and erect them memorials so that their memories should remain forever in our hearts. It has become a popular norm to bury our martyrs with honour, erect stone monuments for them and venerate these war cemeteries as holy places of tranquillity. The practice of venerating heroic martyrdom has become an established tradition in our society."

"... In a surprise move, the Tamil Nadu police was instructed to capture all the communication equipment of Tamil militant groups, especially the LTTE. This was done and Prabhakaran went on a fast.

This generated tension in Tamil Nadu, with everybody disclaiming responsibility for having taken the initiative to clip the wings of the LTTE. Minister Chidambaram, who was in charge of security, came out with a statement that the action was taken without consulting the Central Government. Tamil Nadu Government was annoyed with this and returned the equipment to Prabhakaran, persuading him to break his fast."






Theleepan's fast

Demanding the full implementation of the Indo Lanka accord, Theleepan, a trusted Lieutenant, embarked on a fast which lasted 12 days. He attained martyrdom on the 12th Day.

"...Then the Thileepan fast happened. We tried our best. I went and tried to meet him. LTTE chaps told me, 'General, the people's emotions are so high that if you appear on the scene they might create a problem'. They asked me to stay there. I wanted to go and tell him, Give up. How will he give up? 'Unless the assurances given by the Prime Minister of India are fulfilled I am not giving up', he said. I kept requesting the High Commissioner, 'Come and meet, come and meet, come and meet.' He dragged his feet, he delayed it, he didn't come. Finally he came when the man was dead. We should have saved his life, one life..."



Col. Kittu, another trusted Leiutenant martyred when returning with a peace proposal from the Quaker Foundation. He was surrounded by the Indian Navy in International waters off Sri Lanka in January 1993. He refused to surrender and took his life.

The Visionary Nation Builder

"I am all afire to build up a nation - that is the life-ideal I have set for myself. The future generation is the foundation for the nation we hope to build. Therefore I consider bringing up the future generation and moulding its character and ideals as important as building up the nation."

History has seen successful leaders in all walks of life but they excelled only in one area or another. Prabhakaran is unique in that he is a warrior, protector, carer, family man and remarkable as a nation builder.

Amidst planning the defence of the Tamil territory, providing for his destitute people through a government economic blockade, Prabhakaran also was committed to building a nation. He envisioned a nation completely liberated, not only of army occupation but free also of the evils of the society.

During the five years of his administration (1990-1995) of the Jaffna peninsula, a society devoid of caste, religion and gender bias was built.

Seldom, if ever, rises a leader who acts and thinks of peace-time reforms and setting-up of rehabilitation institutions in a time of war. Prabhakaran has had the vision and the care to do just that. Little is known or commented upon this aspect of the Tamil Leader. The institutions instigated by him have gone far in meeting the needs of the refugees, children who have lost their parents, women traumatised by the evils of war, the physically crippled, and the old in a manner not seen in any war situation before.

As part of nation building, he encouraged and nurtured education for his people, preplanned rehabilitation and programmes for people displaced due to war and long term planning for environmental protection and development. He honoured educationalists and academics in the Tamil homeland and abroad who contributed to the development and preservation of their respective fields.

Children go through the basic disciplines and demands of living together. They are trained for vocations and an equal opportunity is provided for them to sit for all the public examinations. The successful students are a testimony to the 'equal opportunity for all' principle governing Prabhakaran's insistence on setting up such homes.

Rehabilitation Needs

"Our fighters have relinquished their families, their education, their future, the pleasures of their youth, for the liberation of their people. It is the Sinhala state terrorism that has driven our youth to the struggle."

Since 1990, when Prabhakaran encouraged Tamils to study prostheses techniques wherever they could (Germany especially), the White Pigeon Prosthetic Centre has been caring for and fixing artificial limbs for those maimed by war or land-mine accidents.

Using local materials, like wood and aluminium the prosthetic centre has valiantly endeavoured to fit out the maimed to the best of their ability.

"The Tamils cannot wait for an indifferent world to care about the needs of our war-torn Tamil Homelands; we need to help ourselves."

This has always been the attitude Prabhakaran encouraged in his people.





One of the remarkable achievements of Prabhakaran as a leader is his ability to think of the needs of rehabilitation in a comprehensive and lucid manner. Whereas, in most war situations rehabilitation especially for women is hardly a thought, Prabhakaran has instigated the establishment of various homes for the rehabilitation and assistance for women.

The needs have been thought about very clearly and each institution serves a particular group: bereft mothers, mentally disturbed women, young women capable of being trained in specific vocations, disabled and so on. This is sophisticated rehabilitation social thinking, seen more in times of peace rather than during war. Today, these many homes in Eelam are a credit to Prabhakaran as a social thinker.

The most significant aspect of the new law was the removal of the ancient code that gave the husband control over his wife's property."




